PREPARING FOR CAMP

HOW SHOULD I PREPARE MY CHILD FOR CAMP?

- Read books with your child about going to camp.
- Read through this manual and all other information which comes from the camp office. Share the rules and expectations with your child.
- Encourage your child to pick out his or her clothes and to help with packing. Younger children should learn how to make a bed, shower independently, change clothes, set a table, and use a broom.
- Problem solve with your child before camp. “What should you do if you run out of underwear? What will you do if you do not feel well?” Parents might want to try role-playing some possible camp problems with their child.
- Everybody loves receiving mail. Please write or email your child often. It’s nice for a camper to have a letter, postcard or email waiting for them when they arrive at camp, so you may want to send a letter to your child a few days **before camp begins**. Encourage your child to be prepared to write home, and make sure that he or she has the skills and materials (stationary, postcards, and stamps) to do so. When writing or emailing your child, avoid using the word “miss” and substitute it with “love.” Expect some homesick letters at first, and wait for the first two or three letters before assuming the worst.
- Understand that homesickness is a normal part of the adjustment process of separation from one’s family. Discuss your own feelings the first time you left home. Let your child know that you are confident he or she will enjoy camp, new friends, and new experiences. Often second year campers experience the most homesickness, especially if they had “the greatest time in their life” last summer. These children often feel the let-down that camp cannot be the same, and they need time to adjust to their new cabin mates and counselors. Remind your child that they will once again have a great time, but that they will have new experiences and will make new friends.
- Call the camp director if you have any concerns.

CAMPER HINTS

Some Hints for Campers from the book

So, You're Off To Summer Camp:



Lots of kids bring a stuffed animal to camp. They're great for hugging when you're feeling lonely.

If at first camp isn't as wonderful as you expected it to be, give camp (and yourself) three full days before writing anything negative home.

Bring some zany clothes to camp--especially outrageous hats. You will find dozens of uses for them, and the other kids will beat a path to your cabin to borrow things.

Write home often, even if it's only a post card. Your parents are as anxious for mail as you are.

Give new things a chance, whether it's archery or a two day hike. New skills and adventures are what camp is all about.

CAMP FORMS

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE FORMS?

The data you provide gives us necessary information to best serve your child. Each form is reviewed by the appropriate staff with concerns for that area of your child's care. All information is kept in confidence and is seen only on a need to know basis.

WHEN DO I NEED TO RETURN THE FORMS?

To ensure that we are best prepared to serve your camper's needs, all forms need to be reviewed and filed in the proper place prior to the beginning of camp. **All forms (including the Health History form) are due no later than May 1, 2010. Forms should be filled out through the online registration site or mailed to Camp Yofi c/o Merage Jewish Community Center of Orange County, 1 Federation Way, Suite 200, Irvine, CA 92603. A \$25 late fee will be assessed if forms are not submitted or returned by June 1st. If you register after the due date, forms are due 10 days from the date of registration.**

WHEN ARE CAMP FEES DUE?

Full payment is due by May 1, 2010. Your credit card on the application will automatically be charged on May 1.

HEALTH & SAFETY INFO

DOES MY CHILD NEED A MEDICAL EXAM?

Yes. Merage JCC Camp Yofi requires that all campers must be examined by a physician prior to attending camp. However, if your child has had a medical exam within the past 12 months, a complete physical is not needed, **but your doctor will still need to complete the appropriate information (i.e. dates of immunizations) and your doctor MUST sign the form.** The health form has instructions describing what information is required from the family physician and the parent. Please help your physician by filling out the parent's side of the Medical Form prior to your visit. **Make sure to sign the front page of the health form. Accuracy and completeness are essential for the health and safety of your child, as well as for others in camp.** A PDF is attached to the registration site, You can print this form from the online registration site. **You must return the form to the Camp Yofi office at the Merage JCC by May 20, 2010, or 10 days after registration if you sign up after May 1st.**

Because we want to ensure a positive experience for each camper, we ask that any information regarding current treatment of your child by a psychologist, psychiatrist or case worker be documented on the parent questionnaire. The information should also be included or attached to the medical form. This information will be handled confidentially and shared only on a “need to know” basis.

IS IT OKAY TO SEND THE MEDICAL FORMS ON THE BUS WITH MY CHILD?

NO! NO! NO! - PLEASE mail the Health Examination Form and a copy of your health insurance card and prescription drug card to the camp office at the Merage JCC by the previously mentioned date. In order to properly prepare for the care and well being of our campers, our medical staff must have time to review each camper's health record. **It is imperative that we receive a health form from every camper. No camper will be allowed in camp before their completed health form has been reviewed by our medical staff.**

WHAT DO THE MEDICAL SERVICES CONSIST OF?

A licensed nurse is in residence at camp. Our infirmary provides examination and treatment facilities plus overnight accommodations for campers. A hospital and additional medical and dental services are available in nearby Redlands. **CAMP HAS APPROPRIATE MEDICATIONS FOR COMMON AILMENTS. OVER-THE-COUNTER MEDICATIONS ARE NOT ALLOWED. ALL MEDICATIONS SENT WITH YOUR CAMPER MUST BE LISTED ON THE HEALTH EXAMINATION FORM AND TURNED IN AT THE MEDICAL TABLE ON THE MORNING OF BUS DEPARTURE.**

Parents will be notified if a stay in the camp health center is required for your child. Should any accident or illness occur, the nurse or camp director will notify the parent. If a prescription drug is deemed necessary, you will be notified by phone. In addition to a copy of your medical insurance card, you should also include a copy of your prescription drug card (if separate). If local non-emergency medical services are required, you will be notified and the provider or Merage JCC Camp Yofi will bill you for these services.

If glasses are worn by the camper, we advise you to send along a **spare** pair and a copy of the lens prescription. It is also advisable that a dental examination and any needed dental work be completed before camp begins. If necessary, minor dental repair (i.e., loose wire on a brace) will be taken care of by a local health professional and charged to the parents.

HEALTH & SAFETY (con't)

HOW IS MEDICATION DISPENSED?

All medication is distributed by the camp nurse or by a designated staff member under medical staff's supervision. Morning, noon and dinner medications are distributed during meal times. Bedtime medications are distributed at the infirmary immediately after the evening program. Any shots or regular medication that require private administration are given during daily health calls or times set up by the camp nurse.

While our nurse is available 24 hours a day for emergency needs, we need to distribute regular medications on our established schedule. If this presents a problem for your child, please consult with your doctor and the Camp Director on possible flexibility of dispensing times.

DOES CAMP LIVING HAVE ANY EFFECT ON MEDICATION?

Possibly. One significant thought to keep in mind is that camp is a very active environment. Water soluble medication (like Ritalin) may be perspired out of the system at a faster pace than normal. We recommend that parents talk with their child's doctor regarding the camp environment to see if any changes may be necessary. If desired, have your child's doctor call the Camp Director to set up a consultation with the camp nurse. Our experience has been that any medication children take to help them focus in school should also be taken at camp. Our camp medical director will be happy to speak with your child's doctor about this issue.

LUGGAGE & LABELS

WHAT SHOULD MY CHILD BRING TO CAMP?

Each camper may bring two luggage items. This should consist of one duffel bag for clothes and toiletries and one duffel bag for bedding. Please do not over-pack since space to store luggage in each cabin is limited. Warm clothing are essential for evenings at camp. Two blankets are required for each camper. A SLEEPING BAG IS NOT ACCEPTABLE AS BEDDING. Please pack two flat and two fitted sheets, along with your camp blankets.



DO WE REALLY NEED TO LABEL EVERYTHING?

YES! All clothing, personal items and camping equipment **MUST BE CLEARLY MARKED WITH THE CAMPER'S FULL NAME.** If using name tapes, sew them securely where they may be seen. If stamping or marking with indelible laundry ink, make sure it's **legible.** Many campers bring similar items. Unmarked items that are lost are less likely to find their way back to their owner.

WILL SOMEONE KEEP TRACK OF ALL MY CHILD'S BELONGINGS?

Campers must assume responsibility for the proper care of personal belongings. Camp bears no responsibility for lost items. Camp maintains a LOST AND FOUND and will make every effort to return items left behind, **IF WE CAN IDENTIFY THE OWNER. Lost and found articles can be retrieved at the JCC after the camp season ends.** You will be notified as to the dates for claiming lost items. **Anything** remaining after one month will be donated to the needy, or used by camp. **PLEASE, PLEASE LABEL EVERYTHING!**

LUGGAGE & LABELS (con't)

DO I NEED TO PACK ENOUGH CLEAN CLOTHES FOR THE ENTIRE SESSION?

No, laundry services are provided by the camp and are included in the camp fee. **We ask that all items be clearly labeled. Laundry bags should be clearly labeled in large letters on the outside of the bag.** Laundry will be done once per two week session, twice per three week session by a laundry service in nearby Big Bear. No laundry will be done for one week campers. Please realize that this service is a quantity laundry service doing hundreds of pounds of clothing. It is not a delicate service. Camp takes no responsibility for clothing that shrinks, discolors or is lost in the process.

Please pack used, serviceable clothing. Camp is not the place to bring new or expensive clothes or to make a fashion statement.

ARE THERE ANY ITEMS WE SHOULD NOT SEND TO CAMP?

Many campers wish to bring certain items to camp that are unnecessary and inappropriate.

Please DO NOT bring to camp:

Electrical appliances, including: IPODS, PORTABLE DVD PLAYERS, GAMEBOYS and other video games, personal TVs, and stereos. These items will be taken from campers and returned at the end of camp.

IPods or MP3 players. If a camper would like to bring a playlist of songs to share with his/her cabin have the camper bring a CD to camp and we will have the music transferred to the counselor's iPod to play during cabin time.

Items of high value such as watches, jewelry and expensive cameras.

Clothing which is delicate, new or valuable. Please do not pack sexy or revealing clothing or clothing with slogans or pictures advocating use of cigarettes, alcohol, or drugs.

Matches, cigarette lighters, fireworks of any kind.

Tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, controlled substances or over-the-counter medications.

Knives, axes, etc.

Money.

PLEASE DO NOT SEND MONEY TO CAMP WITH YOUR CHILD. The camp will be responsible for paying for all out-of-camp excursions and any incidental expenses will be billed as part of the canteen account. It is totally unnecessary for any age camper, including CIT's, to bring money. Any money brought to camp will be held in the camp office until the end of the session when it will be returned. Camp will not assume responsibility for iPods, CD players, CD's, boom boxes, or for any money that is lost or stolen at camp.

WARNING: SMOKING BY CAMPERS (REGARDLESS OF AGE OR PARENTAL PERMISSION) IS PROHIBITED. ALL CIGARETTES OR TOBACCO ITEMS WILL BE CONFISCATED. POSSESSION OR USE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES OR CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES WILL RESULT IN THE CAMPER BEING SENT HOME. Camp Yofi is a non-smoking environment.

We will be taking luxury coach busses that have bathrooms.

IMPORTANT NOTES PLEASE READ CAREFULLY!

- 1 Your camper will need to pack some healthy snacks, including a drink (no glass bottles, candy or gum).
- 2 Carry all medications with you as you register your camper for the bus. A health table will be set up where our medical staff will take your camper's medications and ask you any pertinent questions. **All medications must be in their original container, clearly labeled, and in gallon size ziplock bags marked with your camper's name and age.** Any medication that your camper needs to take at lunch and dinner should be labeled, in zip lock bags and separated from all other medicines. Lunch medications will be given to the bus counselors who will then give it to your camper when needed. Dinner medications will be distributed by our health care personnel.
3. For health and safety reasons, please say goodbye to family pets at home.

PLEASE FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS LISTED BELOW:

Plan to arrive at the Merage JCC approximately a 1/2 hour prior to the bus' scheduled arrival.

Upon arrival:

JCC Staff will direct you to the luggage drop off point and help you unload your luggage.

(be sure all medications are removed from luggage)

After unloading luggage, please park in the lot.

Enter the JCC and proceed to registration in the Merage JCC Lobby.

Check-In Table:- Receive a name tag and find out who your counselor will be. Pick up your Camp Yofi logo items and goody bags.

Medication Table - All medications (including non-prescription) are collected here. Health forms will be quickly reviewed by the camp medical director and discussed with parents of campers who take medication and/or have medical needs. **All campers MUST check in with the medical staff even if there are no medications.**



BUS RETURN INFORMATION:

Sunday, July 18th:

Bus scheduled to arrive between 12:15-12:45 p.m.

Sunday, July 25th:

Bus scheduled to arrive at 2:00 p.m.

Camp Yofi staff are instructed to call the JCC when they are one hour from their destination. Therefore, it is strongly recommended that you call the JCC (949) 435-3400 an hour before arrival time for an APPROXIMATE time of bus arrival on the day your camper returns.

VISITATION, PHONE CALLS & MAIL COMMUNICATIONS

CAN I VISIT MY CHILD AT CAMP?

Visitations during the camp season are **NOT** permitted. Our philosophy is that when children are at camp, there is a better opportunity for adjustment and meeting the challenges of the camp situation if their stay is uninterrupted by a family visit. One week campers attending from July 18-25 are most welcome to visit and observe the camp during the first two weeks of camp. Please call the Camp Director to schedule a visit.



CAN I TALK TO MY CHILD ON THE TELEPHONE?

Campers are not allowed to use the telephone while at camp. From past experience, we have found that phone calls do not help children who are having a difficult time adjusting to camp. In addition, it would become very difficult to deal with all campers trying to use the phone.

If you require information, or wish us to relay an important message to your child, please call the camp office and speak to the Camp Director or Assistant Director. Parents can also call the camp office at the Merage JCC in Irvine to relay a message.

MAY MY CHILD BRING AND USE A CELL PHONE WHILE AT CAMP?

Campers are not allowed to use cell phones while at camp. **Please do not send a cell phone with your child.** If a camper is found to have a cell phone, the phone will immediately be confiscated and kept in the camp safe. It will be returned to the camper on the last morning of the camp session.



VISITATION, PHONE CALLS & MAIL COMMUNICATIONS (Con't)

HOW ABOUT WRITING LETTERS?

Mail from home is **EXTREMELY** important for all campers. Write cheerful letters, write often, and also ask siblings, friends and relatives to write. **Letters are the most effective tool in overcoming homesickness.** Please remember to **write good news only.** Letters detailing how much you miss your child or what a good time you are having in his or her absence are not helpful. If you have bad or upsetting news that needs to be conveyed to your child, please call the camp office and consult with the Camp Director. Letters from home should only be positive in tone.

We will do our best to see that your child writes regularly. Campers are required to send a letter (or postcard) home twice a week. These letters will be written during rest hour and brought to the camp office to mail the next day.

Many parents find it helpful to send along pre-addressed (and stamped) envelopes or postcards with their child (even for the older campers!). If you do not hear from your child or have other concerns, please feel free to contact the Camp Director.

CAN I SEND CARE PACKAGES FROM HOME?

YES, BUT - **PLEASE, PLEASE - DO NOT SEND FOOD FROM HOME** since food is not permitted in cabins. The camp provides well-balanced, Kosher meals and snacks during the day. Food in the cabins is an open invitation to unwanted critters and can promote disharmony among cabin mates. Packages without food can provide a cheerful smile for a camper having the adjustment blues. **All packages received at camp will be opened in the camp office in front of a staff person and any food, gum, candy, soft drinks, etc., will be removed and donated to a local food pantry.** Also, Camp Yofi campers have enjoyed their care packages from Sealed With A Kiss (eswak.com or 1-800-888-7925).

HOW DO I SEND MY CAMPER E-MAILS?

You will send your camper a Bunk Note by using Bunk1.com. Bunk1.com is a free, secure and easy to use, summer camp website that we will be using to let you stay in touch with your Camp Yofi camper all summer. Set up a new account at www.jccoc.org/camp_yofi.html. Click on the flashing Camp Photos/Camper e-mail button. Click register now. Enter the Registration Code 9948YF1. Fill out the required information and send standard e-mails for free and view camper pictures.

Campers will only receive e-mails through Bunk1.com.



COMMUNICATIONS (Con't)

CAN I SEND MY CHILD SPECIAL BIRTHDAY FOOD AND PRESENTS?

Every camper celebrating a birthday while at camp receives a special dessert with a candle. No one is forgotten. Please do not send special birthday food. Presents are, of course, optional. You may telephone your child on his or her birthday. To set up a phone call, contact the camp office the day before your child's birthday to set up a time for you to call. We will have your child waiting at the camp office when you call. The call will need to be placed at a time convenient to your child's camp schedule. The best times are just after breakfast or lunch. [Calls are limited to five minutes.](#)

WHAT SHOULD WE DO IF WE PLAN TO BE AWAY FROM HOME DURING CAMP?

If you expect to be away from home during your child's stay at camp, please complete the vacation form that is included in the online registration. If you decide to go on vacation after your child has left for camp, or if you need to report any changes on your vacation form, please call the camp office in Angelus Oaks, 909-794-2693. Should an emergency arise, we will need an address and phone number where you can be reached, plus the name of a person and telephone number we can call if we can't reach you.

HOW DO I GET MORE INFORMATION ABOUT MY CHILD DURING CAMP?

Many times parents become concerned about not getting enough information in their child's letters about how camp is going. Some parents have found success through using pre-printed cards on which campers check off answers to multiple choice questions about camp. Also, in your letters or emails to your child, ask specific questions for them to answer when writing back.

If direct communication with your child is not working, you can call camp and ask to speak with the Camp Director or Assistant Director who will check on your child and get back to you. We do not put counselors on the phone with parents because we do not want to take their time away from working with the campers.

HOW WILL THE CAMP COMMUNICATE WITH PARENTS?

"No news is good news," as the expression goes, but we all know that parents are anxious to find out how their kids are doing at camp. We will be emailing camp newsletters once per week. Pictures from camp will be posted in the Bunk-1 photo gallery, and available for purchase. If you have any concerns about your child, you should contact the Camp Director before, during, or after your child is at camp. Parents are often an excellent resource for identifying and solving problems that children are having at camp. If your child is experiencing or causing any unusual difficulties at camp, you will hear from the Camp Director or Assistant Director by telephone. It is essential that we know your whereabouts at all times that your child is in camp.

CAMP LIFE

WHERE WILL MY CHILD LIVE?

Each camper is assigned to a cabin according to his/her age and/or grade in school in September. We make every effort to place your child in a cabin group that will ensure his/her having a positive group experience. Whenever possible, we will place a child in the same cabin with **one** friend of the same grade and gender. A space has been provided for you to inform us of campers that your child wants to bunk with on the enclosed camper form. Please let us know any additional information in writing either on the forms provided or in a separate note.

HOW DOES THE CAMP CANTEEN WORK?

A canteen account is set up for each camper prior to the start of camp. The required amount of money to be deposited is \$20 per week. Snack and drinks, as well as lanyard and some Camp Yofi logo items will be sold in canteen.

WHY IS CAMP YOFI CALLED AN EXPERIENCE IN “LIVING JUDAISM?”

Living as part of a Jewish community is part of what makes Camp Yofi special. The rules and daily routines of camp life are based on Jewish values and practices. Programs are designed to be both fun and educational. From “Hebrew Word of the Day” to experiential, interactive programs concerning Jewish history and Israel, campers learn about their heritage through “hands-on” activities which help them develop a positive Jewish identity.

Counselors are hired not only for their skills and personalities, but also for their ability to be good Jewish role models. Using the Hebrew language, saying *motzi* and *birkat hamazon* before and after meals, celebrating Shabbat, getting to know Israel through the eyes of our Israeli *schlichim* — all these, and more, contribute to a camper’s total Jewish experience at Camp Yofi.

HOW MAY CAMP LIFE BE DIFFERENT FROM LIFE AT HOME?

Camp is a communal living experience. The success of this system is dependent on the cooperation and involvement of all of the participants. Every effort is made to establish a positive atmosphere and to motivate constructive behavior. Children will be sent home from camp if they behave in a way that is detrimental to the camp community. Acting as a responsible member of the camp community is necessary for the well-being of all. Campers are expected to contribute to the overall cleanliness and physical care of the camp. For example, they will participate in camp-wide *nikayon* (clean-up).

Camp requires children to be responsible for their belongings, the cleanliness of both their persons and their personal space, and to be responsible for their actions. Camp helps children develop a greater sense of independence and competence.

There are no parents at camp! Your child will learn to solve problems by working with his or her cabin group and counseling staff. Of course, there are many responsible, older adults in camp. But camp is an opportunity for children to learn to use their own resourcefulness and to problem-solve independently in a supportive and safe environment.
